Saturday, September 15 at 11 a.m. Museum of Craft and Folk Art. (MOCFA is not open on Sunday) "*Fiber Futures: Japan's Textile Pioneers*" This exhibition explores a new art that is emerging from a remarkable fusion of Japanese artisanal and industrial textile making. Coaxed from materials as age-old as hemp and newly developed as microfilaments, a varied array of works by artists from multiple generations are on view in this important two-part exhibition. Our docent, Barbara Shapiro, is one of the leading textile artists in the country, so it should be a fantastic tour! Cost: \$5 for docent plus \$3 admission at the door.

Sunday, Oct. 21 at 9:30 a.m. at the de Young Museum. "*The William S. Paley Collection: A Taste for Modernism*" A selection of major works from the William S. Paley Collection at the Museum of Modern Art in New York. A pioneering figure in the modern entertainment, communication and news industries, Mr. Paley (1901–1990) was a founder of the Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS), and a dedicated philanthropist and patron of the arts. The Paley Collection, which includes paintings, sculpture and drawings, ranges in date from the late 19th century through the early 1970s. Particularly strong in French Post-Impressionism and Modernism. Cost: see October newsletter.
