Culinary Adventures: San Francisco: Wednesday, July 8 at 11:30 a.m. Re-scheduled: *Marla Bakery*, 3619 Balboa (36th/37th); their sign is discreet, but you'll see it next door to Hockey Heaven Bar & Grill. We've recently been to the outer Sunset, now to the outer Richmond where the rest of San Francisco lives and where the outer Richmond is, improbably enough, meeting the Mission with Marla following in the footsteps of Tartine – terrific breads and pastries that achieved cult status from their window on York Street and their coveted space at the Saturday Ferry Plaza Market, followed by a modest brick-and-mortar space (very light, very pretty) and very lovely, simple food. The 31 runs on Balboa as does the 18 (between 33rd and 45th); the 5 runs two blocks south, some 38 Geary buses terminate at 33rd and Balboa; the 1 terminates at 33rd and Geary.

Book Group: The book group will NOT meet in July. The next meeting of the book group will be at 3:00 pm, Sunday, August 9, 2015, at the home of Christie Coffin in Berkeley.

The book for August will be *WEST WITH THE WIND*, by Beryl Markham. “She and her father moved to Kenya when she was a girl, and she grew up with a zebra for a pet; horses for friends; baboons, lions, and gazelles for neighbors. She made money by scouting elephants from a tiny plane. And she would spend most of the rest of her life in East Africa as an adventurer, a racehorse trainer, and an aviatrix—she became the first person to fly nonstop from Europe to America, the first woman to fly solo east to west across the Atlantic. Hers was indisputably a life full of adventure and beauty.”

Many of the attendees at the June meeting will not be here for the September meeting and did not want to impose a choice on those who will attend. Therefore the suggested book for September is *ORPHAN TRAIN* by Christina Baker Kline. “. . .an unforgettable story of friendship and second chances that highlights a little-known but historically significant movement in America's past. . . . Rich in detail and epic in scope, *Orphan Train* is a powerful novel of upheaval and resilience, of unexpected friendship, and of the secrets we carry that keep us from finding out who we are.” (Note that there is another recent book titled *THE ORPHAN TRAIN* by a different author—we are suggesting Kline's book).
