"Narrated in the unforgettable voice of its remarkable heroine, Jane Eyre is a timeless tale of heartbreak, mystery, and romance that shines a brilliant light into the dark corners of Victorian society". We are deliberately scheduling it after a modern author's "prequel" and we're looking forward to seeing whether the prequel changes our reactions to the classic.

The book for February will be *THE GLASS UNIVERSE: HOW THE LADIES OF THE HARVARD OBSERVATORY TOOK THE MEASURE OF THE STARS*, by Dava Sobel. We will watch *GETT, THE TRIAL OF VIVIANE AMSALEM*, a 2014 Israeli film. In Israel, there is neither civil marriage nor civil divorce—only rabbis can legitimize a marriage or its dissolution. But dissolution is only possible with consent from the husband. After a lukewarm marriage of over 20 years Vivian appeals to her husband's compassion to obtain the desirable divorce document. His intransigence and her fight for independence and freedom shape a provocative movie where tragedy vies with absurdity. This film was Israel's official submission to the best foreign film category for the 87th Academy Awards. It should elicit some interesting discussion!
